



GAP 20: URBAN COMMUNITIES

Driving Question for Collaborative Design

How might Christians in the church, parachurch, and workplace collaborate to reach and disciple people living in cities and urban slums, often with a precarious, busy, and noisy existence?

Description

Currently over 50 percent of the global population live in urban areas, with an increasing number of individuals living in informal urban settlements, or slums. Although there are regional differences, this general trend toward overall urbanization within an often very low-quality built environment has caused subsequent changes in access to healthy environments, family structures, personal identity, community formation, working patterns, civic services and more. Such factors affect openness to the gospel and expression of Christian discipleship amidst what is often a precarious, noisy, and complex existence.

Acknowledging these shifts, and their implications for outreach this conversation prayerfully explores:

Collaboration Questions

- How do we wisely reach and disciple urban individuals?
- How do we wisely reach and disciple people living in informal settlements?
- · What commercial, social venture and organizational collaborations could aid in this?
- How can Christians (individually and corporately) best contribute to the shalom of cities and urban communities/informal settlements therein?
